Re: Twenty Day Claim/503(b)(9) Notice

Date: July 31, 2009

Pursuant to order dated September 15, 2008, as amended, the Debtors recently served a notice (the “Notice”): (i) listing each Twenty Day Claim (defined as a claim asserted for priority under Section 503(b)(9) of the Bankruptcy Code for goods delivered within the 20 days prior to the bankruptcy filing) that was the subject of a proof of claim, (ii) the amount, if any, that the Debtors have determined to be valid for each Twenty Day Claim, and (iii) the amount, if any, that the Debtors dispute for each such Twenty Day Claims and the reason(s) for such objection.

If you filed a proof of claim asserting a Twenty Claim, you should have received a copy of the Debtors’ Notice.

If in the Notice the Debtors have disputed any portion of claim or you otherwise disagree with the Debtors’ stated position on your Section 503(b)(9) claim, you must file an objection with the Bankruptcy Court **no later than August 6, 2009** to preserve your rights. Failure to file an objection will result in your Twenty Day Claim being disallowed to the extent it differs from the amount determined by the Debtors to be valid.

If you disagree with the amount stated in the Notice, the OPC strongly recommends that you to file an objection with the Bankruptcy Court **no later than August 6, 2009**.

If you do not understand the Notice, the OPC urges you to discuss it with your counsel and/or counsel for the Debtors. If you are still unable to understand the Notice, the OPC strongly recommends that you to file an objection with the Bankruptcy Court **no later than August 6, 2009**.

If you filed a proof of claim asserting a Twenty Day Claim but are not listed in the Notice, the OPC strongly recommends that you to file an objection with the Bankruptcy Court **no later than August 6, 2009**.

If you filed a proof of claim asserting a Twenty Day Claim but did not receive a copy of the Notice and are unable to obtain a copy from Debtors’ counsel, the OPC strongly recommends that you to file an objection with the Bankruptcy Court **no later than August 6, 2009**.

In all events, you are urged to review the Notice carefully and rely on your own counsel for legal advice as to the filing of any claims, as the OPC is not permitted to give legal advice to individual creditors.
